

Houston Public Media is broadcast over-the-air on both analog FM and HD Radio. If you own an HD Radio, tune it to 88.7 FM and wait for the HD logo to light up. Once it does, you'll be listening to our HD-1 content stream, a simulcast of Houston Public Media's local News 88.7 and national NPR programming. You'll also have access to our two music streams on HD-2 and HD-3. HD-2 provides **Classical 24**, a syndicated satellite-delivered public radio service providing classical music 24 hours a day, distributed by American Public Media. If you're in the mood for contemporary music, HD-3 is home to **Mixtape**, featuring alternative rock from XPoNential Radio, a service of WXPN in Philadelphia. Finally, on HD-4, you'll find **Sight into Sound**, a Houston-based nonprofit organization whose mission is to "Turn Sight into Sound" for individuals with visual, physical and learning disabilities. All of these formats are available 24 hours a day, 365 days a year—and they are all **powered by you**.

Houston Food Bank's Hunger Action Month helps raise awareness of needs in community

The Houston Food Bank is partnering with more than 500 groups and over 3,000 volunteers this month to prepare and distribute meals to the 18 counties they serve with numerous events throughout the Houston region. September is Hunger Action Month which originated 25 years ago, and the Houston Food Bank and other hunger relief agencies across Harris County want to raise awareness to the issue of hunger in the Houston-area.

ENERGY & ENVIRONMENT Fifth Ward residents notified of toxic chemical found in soil samples near Union Pacific railroad

The railyard has been a source of contention for nearby residents for decades, with critics blaming Union Pacific for contaminating the area with cancer-causing chemicals, including creosote—a likely human carcinogen—resulting in Kashmere Gardens being deemed a cancer cluster in 2019. Union Pacific claims they have been working to investigate and clean up the railyard land for the past 30 years, although critics say the company's plan isn't robust.

EDUCATION Houston ISD is the largest district in Texas, but it's getting smaller. What does that mean for funding?

On a warm Saturday morning in mid-September, school counselor Reba Powell knocked on doors in Houston's Independence Heights Neighborhood. She was part of a group of volunteers, staff members and district leaders encouraging students to re-enroll in high school. With about 188,000 students enrolled so far this year, HISD's student body has shrunk by about 23,000 students since the pandemic began. HISD's door-knocking brought back 67 students in one Saturday. For those students, that's a chance to get back on track to earning their high school diplomas.

HERITAGE APPRECIATION MONTH Houston Public Media Celebrates Hispanic Heritage Month

Each year, Americans observe National Hispanic Heritage Month from September through October, by celebrating the histories, cultures, and contributions of American citizens whose ancestors came from Spain, Mexico, the Caribbean and Central and South America. The observation started in 1968 as Hispanic Heritage Week under President Lyndon Johnson and was expanded by President Ronald Reagan in 1988 to cover a 30-day period starting on September 15 through October 15. It was enacted into law on August 17, 1988, on the approval of Public Law 100-402. Houston Public Media proudly celebrates and recognizes the contributions and impact of our country's Hispanic and Latino heritage.

Disaster Relief Director from the Texas Gulf Coast Region of the Red Cross, John Millar said the Red Cross benefits most from time and financial donations.
